2009 Seafair Scholarship Program for Women About the Program

Seafair Scholarship Program for Women

The Seafair Scholarship Program for Women is one of Seattle's oldest traditions. It is designed to give young women the opportunity to celebrate the rich diversity of the Puget Sound region giving them a chance to enrich their lives through community, philanthropy and education. The winner of the Scholarship Program is given the title of Miss Seafair and serves as a representative for the Seafair Festival throughout her year of service.

As part of the program experience, participants are paired with respected local female professionals in a Mentorship Program. This program provides the opportunity for participants to gain professional experience through networking and exposure to the business world. The Mentor Program runs as follows:

- There will be an luncheon for participants to meet their Seafair mentors.
- Mentors will accompany participants to the Admiral's Tea event hosted by the Navy and Coast Guard.
- Mentors are encouraged to attend Creative Expression to support their participants.
- Mentors will be invited to the Commodores Dinner honoring the 2008-2009 Miss Seafair.
- Mentors are encouraged to attend Coronation to support the participants
- Participants are to have at least one meeting with their mentor to review their resume as well as speaking, presentation, and professional skills
- Mentors will provide participants with a letter of recommendation at the conclusion of the program.

The Seafair Scholarship Program for Women concludes with the Coronation which includes the announcement of the 2009 - 2010 Miss Seafair and her Court.

The Goal of the Scholarship Program:

"To enrich the lives of young women through community, philanthropy and education"

- Recognize academic achievement by awarding scholarships to be applied to college, or higher education tuition (Miss Seafair 2009 receives a \$5,000 scholarship with additional scholarships awarded to runners-up).
- Celebrate creative expression.
- Provide exposure to the dynamic cultures of our neighborhood communities.
- Promote community service involvement.
- Develop public speaking skills and confidence.
- Honor 60 years of the Seafair Festival.
- Help participants advance professionally by connecting them with successful business women in the Seattle area.

2009 Guidelines for Participation

- Applicants must be 18 years of age (as of August 2, 2009) or older.
- A United States citizen or permanent resident.
- Be able to show proof of enrollment at a post secondary school, college, university, or vocational institution for the Fall 2009 – Spring 2010 quarter/semester(s).



2009 Scholarship Program for Women Program Judging

Interview: 25% of final score

A panel of Seafair Board members will interview participants. The interview will encompass a number of topics including: academic accomplishments, community service, platform, etc.

Academic Review: 20% of final score

Participant transcripts will be reviewed with several factors taken into account (specific course work, level of difficulty, high school vs. college, etc.). Committee will judge participants on academic achievement.

Community Service Presentation: 20% of final score

The Community Service Presentation will give each participant the opportunity to explain her community service interest to the judges and audience during individual presentations. This presentation will occur prior to the Creative Expression performance.

Creative Expression Performance: 15% of final score

Creative Expression provides an opportunity for each participant to develop and display her creativity, self-expression, confidence and projection through performance. Creative Expression (talent) can fall under the categories of dance, vocal, instrumental, monologue, dramatic interpretation, public speaking, etc. Including cultural features in Creative Expression is welcomed and encouraged.

Speaking Ability & Presence: 10% of final score

Participants will be judged on speaking ability and presence at Rotary and community club meetings. Speaking topics will be explained at Orientation.

Attendance & Mentor Meetings: 10% of final score

Participants will be judged on attendance and punctuality at all events, their optional event attendance, and their involvement with their mentor (meetings, resume critique, etc.).

2009 Scholarship Program for Women Community Service Presentation Stipulations

The Community Service Presentation gives each participant the opportunity to explain their community service project/interest to the judges and audience during their individual presentation.

- 1) A **three-minute maximum** time limit within a minimum of one-minute thirty seconds will be strictly enforced. An official timer will be present and will inform judges of time infractions.
- 2) There will be one (1) point deducted from each participant's score for every five seconds over or under the specified time limit, to a maximum of three points.
- 3) Prior to the actual presentations, **there will be an official run through of each presentation.**
- 4) No Community Service Presentation will be allowed if developed or created by a professional or professional marketing organization. The presentation **MUST BE** a creation of the individual participant.
- 5) The Community Service Presentation topic must be different from that of the Creative Expression Presentation.
- 6) **The participant's presentation must be delivered live during the event.** The Community Service Presentation must be presented by the participant only, without onstage assistance.
- 7) No accompanying material or static props will be allowed on stage as part of the presentation.
- 8) No brochures or handouts are allowed as part of the judging.
- 9) Powerpoint presentations may be used. Please mark with name. **Powerpoint presentations may NOT include video clips or audio. The entire presentation must be delivered live at the event. Deadline for turning in a CD, DVD or flash drive containing powerpoint presentation is Monday, July 13 (community service/creative expression meeting at Kennedy High School).**
- 10) Business attire must be worn during the Community Service Presentation.
- 11) Microphones will be available. A podium will also be provided **with powerpoint remote.**
- 12) The order of presentation will be determined randomly by a drawing at Orientation in early June. The same order for Community Service Presentations will be followed for Creative Expression.
- 13) All community service projects/interests will be considered of equal importance.
- 14) No assistance will be allowed backstage.
- 15) Seafair reserves the right to review and amend Community Service Presentations.

PLEASE NOTE: It is strongly suggested that participants know their presentation by heart. Note cards should be used sparingly by participants during the judged event.

2009 Scholarship Program for Women Creative Expression Stipulations

Creative Expression provides an opportunity for each participant to develop and display their creativity, self-expression, confidence and projection through performance. Creative Expression (talent) can fall under the categories of dance, vocal, instrumental, monologue, dramatic interpretation, public speaking, or the Seafair Option. Including cultural features in Creative Expression is welcomed and encouraged.

Participants may also choose the Seafair Option for their Creative Expression performance. Participants are encouraged to be creative in their interpretations of the Seafair Option. The 2009 Seafair Option is the following scenario: *"The year is 2059...the 100th Anniversary of Seafair! You are invited back to participate in this special celebration. Paint us a picture of the Seafair Festival and Seattle 50 years from now!"*

- 1) A **three-minute maximum** time limit with a minimum of one minute-thirty seconds will be strictly enforced. An official timer will be present at Creative Expression performances and will inform judges of time infractions.
- 2) There will be one point deducted from each participant's score for every five seconds over or under the specified time limit to a maximum of three points.
- 3) All performances must be self contained and flexible to adapt to any venue. Timing of the performance will begin with the first note sung, played, spoke, read, or with the first movement of a routine, etc.
- 4) Judges will be cognizant of overall impression, creativity and/or skill, stage presence, personality, and projection.
- 5) Only the participant will be allowed on stage during the performance, and all performances must be memorized; no sheet music or cards will be allowed for the performance.
- 6) There will be no on-stage accompanist allowed. A CD and backup CD should be prepared and submitted at the rehearsal. Audio CD must be of high quality and labeled on the performance side with the participant's name.
- 7) All props and backstage items needed for the Creative Expression performance must be labeled with participant's name (first and last). Participants must be capable of moving their props without assistance and within given time constraints.
- 8) Participants are responsible for personal belongings. All props must be removed from backstage following the Creative Expression performance.
- 9) There will be assigned rehearsal times on the day of the Creative Expression for those who wish to utilize this opportunity to practice in the venue. If a participant fails to show for the assigned rehearsal time, their time slot will be forfeited.
- 10) The Creative Expression and the Community Service Presentation must be different.
- 11) There will be a keyboard available at the venue, but no piano.

2009 Scholarship Program for Women Rules and Regulations for Program Participants and Miss Seafair 2009 – 2010

Scholarship Program participants become representatives of Seafair and of the Greater Seattle area. These simple rules and guidelines have been developed to make the participants' experience rewarding and pleasurable.

General Overview:

1. Seafair reserves the right to determine the 2009 participants in the Seafair Scholarship Program for Women based on May 29, 2009 deadline materials. Participants will be notified of acceptance into the 2009 Seafair Scholarship Program for Women by June 5, 2009.
2. Decisions of the Seafair Scholarship Program Event Manager, Seafair Staff and Program Chair are to be considered paramount. Others involved with the Scholarship Program should not be asked to make decisions. Consequently, the Seafair Scholarship Program Event Manager and Scholarship Program Chair will make decisions regarding participation in the Scholarship Program.
3. All applicants must be 18 years of age by August 2, 2009 (the concluding date of Seafair's summer events for 2009). Applicants must be high school graduates or graduating high school seniors as of June 2009 and must be enrolled in an accredited institution for higher learning or vocational institution for Fall 2009 – Spring 2010. Applicants must be female, and a United States citizen or permanent resident.
4. All participants are required to have either a Seafair approved supporting association or themselves be approved by Seafair. Supporting associations must be of a community, philanthropic, fraternal, or social nature. School's homecoming representatives are also acceptable. **Independent candidates are welcome.** Seafair reserves the right to refuse acceptance of any supporting association should it be determined that the association represents a controversial, political, or any other type of organization that would detract from the basic purpose of the Seafair Scholarship Program for Women.
5. Each participant will be required to be actively involved with a community service platform. During the Seafair interview, the participant will respond to questions regarding their community service platform, career ambitions, personal achievements, school, current events and future endeavors. Seafair reserves the right to review Community Service Platforms. Participants may also have the option of completing the Seattle Jaycee's Community Service Platform Essay, describing their involvement and dedication to their community/company of service. Essays will be judged by Seattle Jaycee Board Members and scholarships will be awarded accordingly. The Seattle Jaycee's award is an optional addition to the Scholarship Program. Applications will be distributed at the Orientation Meeting. The opportunity to write the essay is currently tentative, but likely.

All participants are welcome regardless of national origin, race, creed, religious convictions or disability. Seafair prides itself on its diversity of participants, volunteers and leadership. The Seafair Scholarship Program for Women attempts to provide a barrier-free program. Please let Seafair know about dietary needs, mobility, equipment requirements, etc.



2009 Scholarship Program for Women Rules and Regulations (continued)

Comportment:

1. Scholarship Program participants will conduct themselves in a proper manner and with the highest degree of integrity at all times as outlined in the rules set forth in the application packet. Scholarship Program participants must remember that they represent community groups, organizations and the community at large, as well as the Seafair Festival. Any actions or behavior that do not positively reflect the Scholarship Program or Seafair will result in penalties affecting further participation in the Scholarship Program.
2. No smoking, drinking of alcoholic beverages or use of illegal drugs will be tolerated during participation in the Scholarship Program prior to, or while participating in a Seafair function. Failure to meet this requirement will subject participants to penalties, affecting further participation in the Scholarship Program. Comportment rules apply to Miss Seafair and the Court during their year of service with Seafair. Inappropriate actions or misbehavior by Miss Seafair and/or Scholarship Program participants will be addressed by the Seafair Scholarship Program Event Manager, Seafair Staff and/or Scholarship Chair in the following manner:
 - A. First notification of inappropriate actions or misbehavior will be given verbally to the individual.
 - B. If inappropriate actions or misbehavior continues, the second notification will be given in writing to the individual and their sponsor. If an individual is without a sponsor, then written notification will be given to their mentor.
 - C. If, after the second notification, the inappropriate actions or misbehavior continues, the Scholarship Program Judges will be given written notification providing documentation of actions taken "A" or "B."
3. Scholarship Program participants are advised against bringing guests to Seafair and community events as it may prove to be a distraction – with the exception of the Coronation, where guests and family members have the option of purchasing tickets.
4. Participants are strictly forbidden to fraternize with Seafair staff, Seafair Family Groups (Commodores, Parade Marshals, Clowns, Pirates, Boat Club Members, Royalty), judges, and fleet drivers outside or during scheduled Seafair parades, festivals, events, activities and could result in penalties affecting further participation in the Scholarship Program.

Public Appearances:

1. Scholarship Program participants must agree not to take part in any commercial print, radio or television advertising, public appearances, endorsements, or photographs from the day of the first scheduled Scholarship Program event to the end of the 2009 Seafair Festival without permission from Seafair. Requests for pictures, interviews, public appearances (other than scheduled Scholarship Program appearances) must be cleared by the Seafair Scholarship Program Event Manager and Scholarship Program Chairs.
2. Seafair has an official photographer who will be identified with a name badge. Participants are NOT TO POSE for or associate with other photographers unless approved by Seafair.



2009 Scholarship Program for Women Rules and Regulations (continued)

Commitment:

1. Scholarship Program scheduled activities, events and rehearsals will take precedence over other commitments. Attendance at Seafair events is mandatory and attendance will be taken. An official list of dates and events will be provided to the participants as soon as possible. An additional schedule for Miss Seafair 2009 and the Court will be provided following the Coronation.
2. A meeting place will be designated by Seafair and referred to as "Home Base." Scholarship Program Participants are responsible for their OWN TRANSPORTATION to and from Home Base (TBA). IT IS IMPERATIVE TO ALWAYS BE ON TIME. It is the Scholarship Program participant's responsibility to have the most recent schedule and arrive on time. If Scholarship Program participants are unable to attend an event, they must inform the Scholarship Program Event Manager prior to the event. For an absence to be excused, contact the Seafair Scholarship Program Event Manager or Scholarship Program Chairs 24 hours in advance. Exceptions will be reviewed on an individual basis.
3. Attire at Seafair events (business attire, summer dress, long formal, etc.) must be appropriate. Low-cut, midriff showing, or revealing attire will NOT be permitted.

Health & Wellness:

1. Any health problems (allergies or medication needs) must be reported to the Seafair Scholarship Program Event Manager and Scholarship Program Chairs. Scholarship Program participants taking antibiotics should NOT ride in parades or appear in sun due to possible reaction.
2. Participants must be sure to get enough sleep and to eat prior to Seafair events, and are encouraged to bring enough money with them to purchase meals when need be.
3. Participants should always bring sunglasses, sun screen, and any necessary medication with them to all Seafair events.

Event and Festival Protocol:

1. Scholarship Program Participants must not leave the company of the group (either at parades, festivals, rehearsals, or events) except by permission of the Seafair Scholarship Program Event Manager and Scholarship Program Chairs.
2. Scholarship Program Participants will not use actions that may incite a crowd (such as squirt guns, silly string, etc.) before, during, or after a parade, festival, event, or activity. This action is subject to penalties affecting further participation in the Scholarship Program.



2009 Scholarship Program for Women Rules and Regulations (continued)

1. Seafair drivers will at no time be allowed to carry passengers other than the assigned Scholarship Program Participants or designated passengers to, from, or during parades, festivals, events, or activities. At no time will Seafair drivers be allowed to leave the group (either at parades, festivals, events or deviate from pre-assigned routes to and from Home Base and parades, festivals, and events), except by permission of the Seafair Scholarship Program Event Manager, Scholarship Program Chairs or Transportation Leader.
2. Scholarship Program Participants are required to check in and check out with the Seafair Scholarship Program Event Manager, Scholarship Program Chairs and/or Chaperone for each parade, festival, event, or activity. Scholarship Program Participants are NOT allowed to leave without first checking out. THIS IS MANDATORY. Failure to comply will result in penalties affecting further participation in the Scholarship Program in compliance with Comportment Regulation paragraph number two detailing inappropriate actions or misbehavior.
3. When parade cars are used, assigned cars are randomly drawn prior to leaving Home Base. Scholarship Program Participants are not chauffeured by one driver exclusively. Participants are to remain in their assigned vehicle for the scheduled event(s) unless prior arrangements are made and cleared with the Seafair Scholarship Program Event Manager and Scholarship Program Chairs. Scholarship Program participants are not allowed to switch cars at the parade site.
4. Event appearances: Sunglasses are not to be worn during parades. The Scholarship Program Participants are responsible for their own hair and makeup for all Seafair events.
5. Participants are required to provide their own meals at specified times on the schedule. Participants are also required to provide their own attire for Seafair events and activities. Seafair encourages participants to wear outfits already owned for engagements.
6. Modifications to Seafair Sashes is not permitted i.e. glitter, colored edging, patches, etc. Modifications to attire provided by Seafair is not permitted without the permission of the Seafair Event Manager or Scholarship Program Chairs.

Serving as Miss Seafair:

1. Miss Seafair must be available to participate in Seafair activities through August 2, 2009 and again from June 1, 2010 through the crowning of the 2010 Miss Seafair (expected mid-July 2010). Special consideration will be given if the chosen Miss Seafair attends school outside of Washington State. This means that if she is sponsored by a community, fraternal, or ethnic group, she will need to put scheduled Seafair events and activities over and above those of her original sponsoring group. If this is not possible, Miss Seafair will need to turn over her responsibilities to the first available alternate for the group.
2. Any actions or behavior that does not positively reflect on the Scholarship Program for Women or Seafair may be considered grounds for rescinding the title from 2009 – 2010 Miss Seafair and all scholarship benefits.
3. **Miss Seafair may not compete in any pageant system during her year as Miss Seafair.**
4. Seafair will approve and schedule all events and activities for Miss Seafair during her reigning year.



2009 Scholarship Program for Women Rules and Regulations (continued)

Scholarship Terms and Requirements:

1. Scholarship Terms and Requirements: Scholarships are nontransferable or redeemable in any other form of payment. Scholarship reimbursements are for tuition and required textbooks only (an itemized detailed receipt will be required) while attending an accredited institution for higher learning or vocational institution. Scholarships may not be used for lodging, transportation, student loans, non-required books or fees, etc. Any questions regarding this payment should be discussed with Seafair prior to incurring any expenses.
2. Scholarship money will be paid directly to the accredited educational or vocational institution selected by the applicant. The scholarship recipient will not be reimbursed for any payments or loans made previous to the scholarship award. In the event that the scholarship recipient fails to utilize the total amount of scholarship award within twenty-four (24) months or by September 1, 2011, the award will revert to the scholarship fund. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**

Decisions of the Judges are final. Tabulation of scores are completed and verified by the Seafair auditing firm. Results remain closed.

Seafair Scholarship Program for Women judges and their families, Seafair employees and their families, Seafair Scholarship Program Committee members and their immediate families, the current Seafair Board of Directors, Senior Council, Advisory Board and their immediate families, and former Miss Seafair's are ineligible to participate in the Scholarship Program.

Former Scholarship Program participants are eligible to repeat the application process for participation in the program.

Seafair reserves the right to change or cancel any aspect of the program at any time.
